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


Music Trivia Night

Need Affordable Food?

The Good Food Box makes top-quality, fresh food available in a way that does not stigmatize people, fosters community development, and promotes healthy eating.

What Is It?


The Good Food Box (GFB) is a program under the Community Kitchen Program of Calgary whereby they purchase fresh fruits and vegetables at a very low cost from growers and distributors in Calgary. The Good Food Box is a hand-up program as opposed to hand-out. They offer all Calgarians and surrounding areas sustainable access to nutritious food to ensure that everyone can afford fresh produce, so no one has to go hungry. The boxes are put together by dedicated volunteers who, along with The Community Kitchen Program and the BTCA, desire to see individuals and families accessing affordable nutritious food.

Information

Since the 1960s, various groups have lobbied to have Nose Hill preserved as a natural park. In 1972, a group representing eight communities pursued the matter. The result was the Nose Hill Design Brief, a City plan to set aside 1,600 hectares.

In 1976, however, the City rezoned part of the land for housing. In response to public discontent, the City reviewed the zoning issue, and in 1980, approved the Nose Hill Park Master Plan, which aimed to preserve 1,096 hectares as a park.

In 1981, the Nose Hill Park Communities Board was formed to provide public input into implementation of this plan. Twelve community associations were represented on the board, and it kept the issue in the public eye. The City finally reached a deal with remaining landowners in 1989 and the 1,052 hectare Nose Hill Park became a reality.

The remarkable Glenbow Library and Archive, a collection that documents the history of Western Canada, is now housed at the University of Calgary as the Glenbow Western Research Centre. The Nose Hill Park Communities Board files contain historical information: briefs, plans, proposals, reports, submissions, legal papers, maps, and drawings.



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Investing In Our Future

A balanced budget and a growing economy create jobs and enable us to invest in what is important to Albertans. Here are a few highlights on how our government is investing in Alberta.

Supporting Job Creation

Our province created 88,800 new jobs in 2022 (almost 25 percent of all new jobs created in the country). Job outlook for 2023 has forecasters predicting more economic growth and diversification on the horizon for Alberta.

Diversifying the Economy

Alberta is once again a top destination for investment capital. The last few years saw major investments from companies like Telus, Mphasis, Amazon, Walmart, Air Products, Dow, PIP International, de Havilland, and Phyto Organix Foods, to name a few. Imperial Oil recently announced that it is building a \$720 million renewable diesel facility – the largest facility of its kind in Canada – in Alberta.

International credit rating agencies are taking note of Alberta. Moody's Investors Services upgraded Alberta's credit rating to AA2. This decision speaks volumes about our government's management and decision-making as we focus on healthcare, education, the economy, and affordability for all Albertans.

Investing in Healthcare

A balanced budget and growing economy allow us to continue to invest in healthcare. We have invested a record breaking \$22 billion in healthcare in 2022, the highest amount ever, and we will continue to invest more in Budget 2023.

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
